- Child Safety Policy and Process, an important policy to reflect our commitment to working with children and establish clear responsibilities regarding the safety and wellbeing of children who connect and interact with MainFM.
- a Code of Conduct.

I look forward to continuing my MainFM journey as a volunteer on the CoM alongside my colleagues, all MainFM volunteers, listeners and community as we support the best station in the nation.

Treasurer's Report

The 2024-25 financial year has seen MainFM navigate a period of consolidation following several years of post-pandemic recovery and growth. While the broader economic landscape remains challenging with continued cost-of-living pressures and a tightening of grant funding, the station has demonstrated resilience and adaptability in maintaining high-quality operations and strong community engagement.

This year's financial results reflect a shift from the exceptional income levels achieved in 2023–24 to a more stable and sustainable operating position. Total income for the period was \$175,382.57, compared with \$218,575.47 in the previous financial year, a decrease primarily due to lower grant income and reduced fundraising revenue. Despite this, MainFM continued to strengthen its operational income streams, with sponsorship, membership, and subscriber income all showing healthy results, illustrating the ongoing support and value placed on the station by our community and local business partners.

Grant funding for the year totalled \$49,690.54, representing a significant reduction from \$105,634.00 in 2023–24. This decrease was largely due to the conclusion or scaling back of specific project and salary grants. Nevertheless, we are proud to have secured continued core funding from the Community Broadcasting Foundation (CBF), which has been instrumental in supporting our staffing structure and ensuring consistent leadership and operations. This support not only strengthens our capacity to deliver quality programming but also reinforces the station's commitment to professional development and community service.

Operating expenses for the year were \$176,851.91, down from \$197,397.59 in the previous year, reflecting strong cost control and disciplined financial management. Nonetheless, with total expenses slightly exceeding income, the station recorded a modest net loss of \$1,469.34 for the financial year. While this marks a shift from last year's surplus of \$21,177.88, the result remains consistent with the strategic objective of maintaining stability during a period of reduced external funding.

Despite the small deficit, MainFM closes the financial year in a strong and stable position, with healthy equity reserves that provide a solid foundation for the year ahead. This position enables the station to continue investing in its people, technology, and community outreach while maintaining prudent financial oversight. Key areas of investment included equipment maintenance and upgrades to support reliable broadcasting services, as well as targeted spending on marketing and community events to maintain visibility and engagement. These outlays contribute to the long-term sustainability and operational readiness of the station.

As we move into 2025–26, the financial focus will be on rebuilding and diversifying income sources while continuing to seek core support from the Community Broadcasting Foundation (CBF). The coming year will also see renewed efforts to strengthen volunteer engagement and operational efficiency, ensuring MainFM remains a vibrant, accessible, and community-owned broadcaster.

In summary, while 2024-25 presented financial challenges, the organisation remains in a sound position with stable equity and a clear path toward sustainability. The station's ability to adapt to changing funding landscapes, supported by a dedicated volunteer base, CBF funding, and a committed management team, continues to be its greatest asset as we plan for the years ahead.

On behalf of the Board, I extend my heartfelt thanks to all members, sponsors, volunteers, and supporters for their ongoing commitment to MainFM's success. It has been a privilege to serve as Treasurer, and this report marks my final financial report for MainFM.

Station Manager's Report

When I reflect on MainFM's journey, I'm struck by just how extraordinary this little station is. Community media is a tough game but somehow MainFM continues to shine. And we do it with style, heart, and the unmistakable joy that comes from over 100 local rad humans showing up for their community.

Despite the spanners and operating on reduced staff hours, this year has been one of momentum. Long-planned improvements are coming to life. Under the leadership of our Technical Coordinator Martin Cliffton and his tech wise team, we are focussing on our IT foundations with big changes being made to how we manage the formidable data flow that comes with broadcasting 24/7. These big structural changes sit quietly behind the scenes but will deliver big gains. We've been promising it for a while, but ON Demand is coming! We just need to build a new website to accommodate it first. But it means you'll be able to listen back to your favourite shows with ease.

Our programming has never been stronger. Under the expert leadership of our Programming Coordinator Melissa Scott and our hard-working Programming Committee, our busting-at-the-seams grid continues to thrive with shows spanning music, talk, storytelling and specialist content. The breadth and quality of radio being made here is remarkable. Special programming flourished again this year: from Campbells Creek Primary School, Castlemaine Secondary College, The Pause and Able Radio's, as well as special content for International Women's Day, Aus Music Week, NAIDOC, Pride, 16 Days of Activism and much, much more. This is what community radio does best – amplifying local voices that deserve to be heard.

Our work continues around building community resilience. With assistance from a grant through FRRR we've purchased back up power generators and UPS machines for power outages. We've strengthened relationships with the Castlemaine SES and Emergency Expo. We took part in the Mount Alexander Shire Community Led Flood Recovery & Resilience Workshops, working with organisations to plan and prepare community led response to disaster. We undertook Emergency Preparedness training, to evaluate MainFM's ability to operate in disaster scenarios. A hypothetical that was put to the test when our station was badly damaged due to flooding from a burst water main on the first floor of the Old Hospital. A major incident that we are still recovering from. Thanks to the professionalism of volunteers present at the time, no one was injured and was able to exit the building safely. Our amazing tech team MacGyvered a remote station at the base of our transmitter, in the bush at the Optus tower behind Don, so we were able to continue broadcasting, albeit with pre-record content only, which is how we continued for an entire month until it was safe to re-enter the building. Then the re-build works of our studios began.

Our community engagement was vibrant, too. With our OB van in tow, we broadcast from Idyll, Town Folk, Rotary Carols and more. We strengthened youth engagement through a new partnership with Castlemaine Secondary College and continued building relationships with local organisations thanks to Sue McLennan's expert stewardship of our sponsorship and partnerships portfolio. The generosity of our sponsors – particularly evident in the Radiothon prize haul – is something we never take for granted.

To our volunteers – thank you. You are the soul of this station. To our staff team – Sue, Alex, and now Lauz! – your dedication, humour and creativity make MainFM a truly joyful place to be.

To our Committee of Management – your guidance, steadiness and care underpin everything we do. Exemplified by the publication of our Strategic Plan for 2025-28, a document that will underpin our planning and activities for the years to come.

In sadness, we said farewell to Col, a much loved member or our radio family. Forever jamming with Jerry Garcia in the stars.

MainFM is, at its core, a place of belonging. You can hear it in the sound, and I'm incredibly proud to lead this vibrant, resilient, unstoppable little station.

The Committee has also been monitoring the gender ratio - we currently have 43 women and 62 men presenters. In the future, it would be good to achieve a more equitable split.

I would also like to thank our Station Manager Steph for steering the ship and the Committee of Management for assisting with issues such as AI. Special thanks to Bradley Dawson for helping with the website and Steve Charman for setting up folders and sequencing.

Technical Coordinator's Report

2025 started with plans to do many things, the priority being the upgrade of all computers to Windows 11.

Then on 27th June, 2025 the station was flooded.

The offices were uninhabitable but in less than 24 hours we were back up and running in a limited capacity. For nearly a month we had no access to the Halford St offices and all content was provided by playlists and prerecords with no live broadcasts.

However, with adversity comes opportunity. During the downtime, and in the weeks following, much work was done on a technical front:

- Studios 1 &2 were upgraded with all new hardware (computers, monitors etc).
- Studios 1 & 2 under-desk cabling was reworked to keep everything off the floor.
- Station servers and remote-access PCs upgraded to Windows 11
- Management platforms upgraded. SMS alerting now active in the event of power failures at station and tower.
- Delegation Switcher (facilitates switching between studios and playlist) was repaired.












Events, Special Programming & Community Engagement



Radiothon - Share The Love



Radiothon 2024 carried the theme "Share the Love", celebrating the deep connection between MainFM, our listeners, and the local business community. The theme reflected the ongoing passion for community radio and the collaborative spirit that sustains us.

Radiothon 2024 was held against a backdrop of sector-wide challenges. In early 2024, we were advised of significant reductions in federal government funding across the community radio sector. This had a direct impact on our operations, resulting in reduced staff hours and a need to reassess resources.

Despite these pressures, the community rallied. We made a modest increase to subscription fees, and as a result, and thanks to continued listener loyalty, we saw a 3.5% increase in subscriber revenue compared to 2022–23.

Our generous prize pool totalled \$10,000, thanks to the ongoing support of businesses both local and from further afield. This incredible backing from our sponsors and other businesses highlights the enduring value they place on MainFM and its role in the region.

Radiothon remains not just a fundraiser, but a powerful annual reminder of the collective love for independent media, community storytelling, and local voices.





The MAIN Game



Our beloved annual footy match fundraiser, The MAIN Game, delivered another memorable day of community and connection, despite the rain! The event continues to be one of MainFM's most successful fundraising initiatives, reinforcing its place as a true highlight on the Castlemaine calendar.

This year it was the Rockatoos who were victorious with a convincing 26 point win over the Radio Galahs, delighting their loyal supporters.

Entertainment was a major feature once again with the iconic Thompsons Foundry Band kicking things off with their trademark brass brilliance whilst Curlers kept the energy high with a lively half-time set and the Rural Hot B*tches literally hitting the ground with a fierce and hilarious three-quarter time dance routine.

Saltgrass funded by the Community Broadcasting Foundation


Saltgrass is a show about how our community is grappling with the climate crisis. Hosted by Allie Hanly, the show deep dives into the minds, hearts and activities of everyday people here in Castlemaine and surrounds. The goal is always to inspire, educate and help people feel connected to a vital and important movement.

Saltgrass has been broadcasting since 2020 and has received international recognition, gained a loyal local audience and won a couple of national awards. There are now over 100 episodes to enjoy and they are all available on the podcast. New and repeat episodes air every Monday morning on MainFM at 9am.

It has been a year with a lot of activity behind the scenes but not many episodes published.

Allie is still in editing and production mode for season 6 of Saltgrass which will take listeners with her across the Nullarbor and into the desert of WA with a group called Desert Discovery. They are citizen scientists and nature enthusiasts who drive deep into the outback to count lizards, birds and flowering bushes. All data is given to universities and public organisations to help build a knowledge base about what ecosystems look like in remote Australia. This season is due to launch in late 2025.

Chris Palamounton from Kyneton has gone from strength to strength with his joke segment and is a fabulous addition to the team. All Chris's jokes are original, which makes it even more impressive, while local icon Peter Sainsbury has been a regular inclusion on the show, willingly sharing his thoughts and his old-school love of 50s, 60s and 70s music.

Jacob Creme has been making the weekly trip down from Bendigo to close out the show with a mix of hard rock and heavy metal. It's his passion and it's been a welcome addition to the program.

Able Radio continues to provide a much needed voice to the disability community and has up to eight regular panelists, with a few additions attending on a more casual basis. I have seen panelists such as Katie Nolan grow immensely in confidence over the past year, from someone who was quite shy to now singing and laughing and having a great time while live to air.

Over the course of this year, I have been working with a group from Able Radio to create a podcast, centred around Windarring and the various programs and opportunities they offer. As a result of this, we have been able to promote Able Radio on this format and I see further opportunities for the two to intertwine. We are all looking forward to yet another fulfilling and busy year of Able Radio.

Sponsorship & Partnerships



Sponsorship remains a vital part of MainFM's ongoing success, contributing significantly to our overall income and helping us continue to serve and connect our community.

In the 2024-25 financial year, MainFM generated \$69,792.08 in sponsorship income, a solid increase from the \$42,141.68 raised in the previous year 2023-24. This growth reflects both the value local businesses place on their association with MainFM and the reach our station provides.

We offer a range of flexible sponsorship packages, including:

- The opportunity to sponsor The MAIN Game

More than 60 businesses and organisations supported MainFM through business sponsorship, the majority being local enterprises who value our role in building community and providing a trusted platform for connection and promotion.

In addition to our business sponsors, there were over 30 businesses and organisations who partnered with us through short-term sponsorship campaigns. NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

CASTLEMAINE DISTRICT RADIO INC.

For the 12monthsperiodending 30 June 2025, Castlemaine District Radio reported a deficit of \$1,469.34. This is a\$22,647.22 decrease in profit when compared to the financial year ended 30 June 2024. The decrease is mainly due to a reduction in grant funding income. In reaction to the reduction of grant funding available, station management & the board took action and lowered the wage costs, relying on community volunteers to fill the gaps.

Key financial outcomes for 30 June 2025 Financial Year:

Net deficit \$1,469.34 Cash at bank \$90,099.60 Total assets \$125,575.25 Total liabilities \$18,680.07 Net Assets \$106,895.18

Total income for the 12-month period is reported to be \$175,382.57. This is a 20% decrease when compared to the sameperiod for the year ending 30 June 2024. Most significant decreases in income numbers were from Fundraising and Grant Funding. We note an excellent result for sponsorship income, reporting an increase of 65% compared to the previous 12-month period.

Total operating expenseswere \$176,851.91 for the financial year ended 30 June 2025. There was an overall net decrease of \$20,545.68 or 10% in expenses when compared to the financial year ended 30 June 2024. While there were decreases in the cost of insurance and rent, and wages were brought back, significant increases were seen in events & marketing, licenses, merchandising, studio equipment and office expenses.

Looking forward, the management team and board are taking a more proactive role in financial management of the station. We hope that we can continue to assist as required to ensure that Castlemaine District Radio Inc can report a healthy financial result for the coming financial year.
